

Our first session was introduced by Dr. Beno Klemenčič, director of the school. He presented the region of Pomurje and the population living there. He also mentioned the economic activities going on in the region as well as the advantages of it.




First session on 10 April


Slovenian education system and language teaching

Erna Vöröš, lecturer at Ekonomska šola Murska Sobota, Višja strokovna šola, explained the Slovenian education system and language teaching. Basic education starts at the age of 6 and finishes at the age of 15. After finishing elementary school students can continue with their education at different types of secondary schools such as general upper secondary schools, technical/vocational upper secondary schools or short vocational upper secondary schools. According to the school they finish, they



can continue with their higher vocational education, their first cycle professional education or first cycle academic education. After finishing either first cycle academic or professional education they can continue with their Master and Doctor Study. Foreign language teaching starts in the 4th class of elementary school and it is compulsory. Pupils can choose between English and German. However, a lot of elementary schools start foreign language teaching in the 3rd class already but without grading pupils. The second foreign language is introduced in the 7th class. Foreign languages being taught are English, German, Italian, French, Spanish, Hungarian or Croatian. In upper secondary education they continue with their first and second foreign language. In general upper education they can also choose a third foreign language.





Second session on 10 April

Language exams in Slovenia

Karina Kreslin Petković presented language exams in Slovenia, especially in general secondary and technical/vocational secondary education. The exams are called Matura and Vocational Matura. They are both national exams. The Matura is a school-leaving exam required for the completion of secondary education and for university entrance. Thus the Matura represents not only a final exam but also a continuation regulating the transition from secondary to tertiary education, as is the case of educational systems in many European countries. The Vocational Matura is a form of a school-leaving exam giving a candidate technical education and it enables candidates to continue studies in vocational colleges and other colleges without any additional requirements.






Third session on 10 April 2013

Your place in rural heritage

This interesting lecture was held by Martin Clark, director of Grampus Heritage and Training, UK. He talked about how landscape can teach us about the place we are in. This is especially important for migrants who move to new environments, a lot of times unknown to them. Understanding the landscape can help them to feel »a little bit closer to home«. Parish churches, monuments, castles and other buildings, even trees can tell us stories about traditions and life in places we have never been before. We explored the town of Murska Sobota by using the method, presented by Martin Clark. He took us through the town and taught how to look for signs that could tell us more about the past, traditions and the people of the town. Fourth session on 11 April

Teaching methods and demonstration

Erna Vöröš presented different teaching methods and their demonstrations. She presented some visual aids which can be quite useful for teaching grammar to beginners. You can teach singular/plural, numbers, colours, articles and other things. Another method used for Business English students is checking supermarket psychology, such as »Eye level is buy level«, »special offers« or »the checkout as a danger area for impulse buys like sweets and chocolates, where especially parents buy these things to keep their children quiet while waiting« in practice and report in English. It is a challenge from the language point of view but also fun for students as they talk about personal experiences. She also talked about the "do's" and "don'ts" of giving presentations.






Fifth session on 11 April

Teaching methods and demonstration

Karina Kreslin Petković presented different teaching methods such as the direct method, grammar translation, the audio-lingual method, the structural approach, communicative language teaching and some others. In class she uses a mixture of these methods according to the language level of her students. She also presented some Headway tools, ICT tools that go with the study books she uses. They are very useful for teaching speaking, listening, reading and writing skills with interesting exercises and tasks. She also presented how to use the game Scrabble for improving spelling of words. Students like that because they can compete with each other and this makes it more interesting.





Sixth session on 12 April

The Danish group presents their language projects

Kurt Rasmussen, German teacher at VoksenUddannelsescenter explained and showed us how to use fairy tales for language teaching. He uses the Grimm's Brothers fairy tales in his German lessons in a very modern way. Signe Hansen, English teacher at VoksenUddannelsescenter, explained first of all what the goals are that her students have to achieve after finishing her course. Then she showed an example of how to use literature to motivate students to be creative and write their own literature such as director of Henning Jensen, education at poems. VoksenUddannelsescenter, Peter Rohde presented Jensen's contribution. He prepared a series of video clips presenting his students from the Spanish class. They presented how to prepare tea, cake and other meals in Spanish. Peter was inspired by the presentation of Ken Nein who showed us how to teach language by doing different activities, in his case it was baking brownies. The presentation was a part of the first Grundtvig project meeting in Berlin, 23.-27.10.2012. Peter uses the video presentations as a substitute for written exercises in Spanish teaching. Peter Jensen is a Danish and Spanish teacher at VoksenUddannelsescenter.





Final session on 12 April

Discussion about the final product of the project

The main discussion was about the final product of the project. Most of the participants agree that whatever the product will be it should be published online with the possibility to download it as for many it will be necessary to present a final »product«, which could be a leaflet, a brochure, a handbook, a CD/DVD or something similar. It was also discussed to prepare online courses for different groups of students, for example IT students. The main point everybody agreed on was to focus on teaching methods which take place outside the classroom and help to learn languages. The structure for the next meeting was determined as well. We have to decide on methodologies used, what the language level of students should be and the size of the group of students.



Discussion on webpage and dissemination

The webpage will be prepared by the German team. All the materials so far will be published.

Discussion about future meetings

It was defined that the fourth meeting will take place in Denmark, from Wednesday 25 to Friday 27 September 2013. Tuesday, 24.9.2012 is arrival day and Saturday, 28.9.2012 is departure day.
